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Predator-prey		<i>One animal eats another</i>	<i>Hawk eats squirrel, wolf eats elk</i>	<i>Feeding relationship where one animal kills and the other is killed</i>	<i>Bear eats a fish</i>
Competition		<i>Two animals fight for the same food</i>	<i>Grizzly bears and wolves compete for elk</i>	<i>Two or more species require the same limited resources</i>	<i>European green crabs and native crabs compete for food</i>
Symbiosis	Commensalism	<i>One animal benefits and other does not</i>	<i>Bug hitchhiking on a person, remora fish on a shark</i>	<i>Helps one species and doesn't help or harm the other</i>	<i>Fox using a groundhog burrow</i>
	Mutualism	<i>Both animals benefit</i>	<i>Clownfish and anemone, people and digestive bacteria</i>	<i>Helps both species involved</i>	<i>Plover eating food from crocodile's mouth</i>
	Parasitism	<i>One animal benefits and the other is harmed</i>	<i>Ticks feed on cow, lice feed on fish</i>	<i>Benefits one species (parasite) and harms the other (host)</i>	<i>Tapeworm living in intestine of an animal</i>
